Dear Customers:

Our nursery had an exceptional and exciting year in 2009. The **Grand Championship** was won by Blossom Hill Nursery with an intersectional peony, Bartzella, at the Canadian Peony Society Convention in June 2009 at the Montreal Botanical Gardens. An entry of cut flowers including delphiniums and peonies won 'Best in Show' at the Ontario Horticultural Society Convention held at Trent University in July 2009. We also received The Outstanding Business Achievement Award from The Kawartha Lakes Chamber of Commerce Eastern Region. Blossom Hill Delphinium elatum have won in 2000 and 2001, the only two Canadian Bronze medals awarded from The UK Delphinium Society.

Blossom Hill specializes in **delphiniums and peonies**. In recent years we have offered mail order services to Canadian and USA destinations, as well as direct sales from our home. Many years ago, we added British strain Delphinium elatum to our gardens and discovered that they possess stronger stems and larger florets. They are also hardier than other Delphinium elatum. We have been hybridizing our own strain ever since.

Many of the peonies that we are growing in our field are now mature enough to offer for sale. We are excited to include **92 new varieties of peonies** to this year's catalogue. We now have more than 400 varieties (2000 plants) including species, tree, herbaceous and Itoh (Intersectional) peonies. The collection produces an amazing show. Visitors are welcome at the nursery to view our many perennial beds and trial gardens. The main show for peony flowers is the month of June, with some blooming in late May and early July. Delphiniums tend to flower from mid-June to mid-July and again in late summer and autumn.

We open Saturday, April 24th until December 24th. After the growing season, we still have dried flowers and Christmas decorations for sale at the nursery. Business hours are by appointment or chance. **We will be closed on Tuesdays this year.**

Our catalogue continues to be in a plant list format without pictures to reduce printing expenses. However, photographs of many of our plants are posted on our website for your information and enjoyment.

We look forward to serving you again this season.

Delphinium elatum

Delphinium elatum are hybrids. Therefore, they do not produce identical seedlings. Colours include dark, medium and light shades of blue, purple, pink and bicolor (both blue and purple on the same floret) as well as white. The center of the floret referred to as the 'bee', may be white, black, brown or striped. All plants are guaranteed to be at least semi-double with no fewer than 13 petals. Variations in growth and colour may occur due to location, atmosphere, soil conditions, etc.

The Delphinium elatum that we sell are our own hardy Canadian hybrids available as:

- (1) Seedlings – colour not guaranteed
- (2) Year old plants that have already flowered with the florets colour indicated; or
- (3) A very limited supply of cuttings of our best parent plants. The cuttings are identical clones of the mature plants that have been strong growers in our gardens for several years.

Delphiniums are fast growing perennials and many are two gallon size. The plants that are shipped will be removed from pots but much of the soil will remain. Some of our other perennials may be shipped bare root depending on the species.

Seedlings Colour not guaranteed \$12.00 per plant

These plants did not flower last season. Later this spring, plants available will be this year's seedlings. If they have not flowered yet, the colour of the cross is a very good indication of the colour, but there may be some variation.

Cuttings

These **sold out** last autumn, so none are available for this catalogue.

These plants are rooted cuttings of our favourite, strongest growing plants, many of which have been growing in our garden since before the beginning of Blossom Hill Nursery. Because these plants are propagated from cuttings, they will be identical to the original parent plant in all aspects such as colour, form and hardiness. The process is very labour-intensive, so there is a limited supply of only our best plants.

Delphinium elatum Growing Tips

Often delphiniums are thought of as difficult and time consuming to grow. This is not the case. While like all plants they thrive in ideal conditions, a few basic growing techniques will ensure quality spikes in most gardens.

Soil: Delphiniums prosper in most soil types. Amend the soil with compost before planting. Do not allow waterlogged soil as this will promote crown rot. If necessary, raise the bed slightly.

Transplanting: Delphiniums do not like to be disturbed but if necessary move only young plants and very early in the spring, just as they begin to grow.

Thinning: As the plants mature, if they produce many stems, the weak ones should be cut off close to the ground in early spring. The remaining stems will grow stronger and produce a better display.

Watering needs to be consistent, especially during the growing season. Delphiniums are shallow rooted but a good soaking once a week should suffice for mature plants. We are on a hill with south exposure and rely on well water, so our watering is minimal. Mulch may be beneficial but not directly on the crowns.

After flowering cut off the spikes but leave the foliage until new growth starts at the base of the plant, to promote strong roots. You may be rewarded in the autumn with a second flowering but the spikes likely won't be as tall as in July.

Winter care: Cut off plant material and clear the beds of debris before the winter, to reduce the possibility of slug damage. Our Delphiniums are very hardy and do not require winter mulch. They enjoy a good snow cover, if Mother Nature provides it in your area.

Peonies

Peonies are divided and shipped bare root in autumn, starting in September. All roots are from field grown plants and will be large divisions with at least 3 to 5 eyes. We encourage customers to visit our gardens throughout the season to choose plants according to bloom and foliage. Other varieties may be available for sale at the nursery, some as potted plants in the spring.

If you are searching for a particular peony not listed, contact us. We may have it but not in sufficient numbers for the catalogue.

'ALM' – Award of Landscape Merit: This award denotes peonies that have outstanding landscape and growth characteristics including their ability to stand up in inclement weather and disease resistance. The first year for this award was 2009. Each year worthy peonies will be honoured. We expect many more of the varieties that we grow will receive this award.

'NEW' – These peonies are being offered in our catalogue for the first time but have been growing in our gardens for several years.

Alexander Woollcott - (Saunders, 1941) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$50.00 Large semi-double *crimson red* flowers, on strong stems make an excellent display. Early bloom.

Alley Cat- (Klehm, 1995) Lactiflora, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$35.00 Unique irregular shaped petals are *cream with pink* tips. Some side-buds and slight fragrance. Early

Amberglow – (Thurlow & Stranger, 1951) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Double, *flesh pink* fragrant flowers on strong stems. Buds are delicate pink. Medium height and flowers midseason. Our puppy is named after this peony (shortened to Amber).

America – (Rudolph, 1976) Herbaceous Hybrid, APS Gold Medal 1992, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$35.00 Large single *scarlet* flowers held very upright for an excellent landscape plant. Early bloom on a great all season plant. Slight fragrance.

Angel Cheeks – (Klehm, 1970) Lactiflora, APS Gold Medal 2005, **NEW**

\$30.00 Double bloom of *soft pink* with light cream petals at the base. Sturdy stems for good presentation. Slightly fragrant. Blooms midseason

Ann Berry Cousins – (Cousins, 1972) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 An excellent peony by the Canadian breeder, Lyman Cousins. Semi-double *salmon* with deeper shades toward the centre of golden stamens. Blooms early.

Athena – (Saunders, 1949) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$45.00 A single cup shaped peony from a quadruple cross of four species. *Peachy ivory* petals with large rose pink flares. Strong stems, excellent foliage and fragrant. One of the first peonies to bloom.

Bartzella – (Anderson, 1986) Intersectional; APS Gold Medal 2006, Award of Landscape Merit 2009, \$155.00 Double *yellow* hybrid with red flares. A very floriferous, strong plant which flowers sequentially for an extended bloom period. The large flowers are supported by strong stems and the foliage is excellent well into the fall even in dry seasons.

Current (2009) **Grand Champion** at the Canadian Peony Society Convention (Hazel Cook's entry)

Bowl of Beauty – (Hoogendoorn, 1949) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$25.00 A very popular Japanese shaped lactiflora with large *magenta* petals surrounding creamy yellow staminodes. Blooms mid to late season.

Bravura Supreme – (Krekler) Lactiflora, **SOLD OUT**

\$35.00 A brilliant *red* single that stands out in the field. Flowers early.

Bright Diadem – (Saunders, 1950) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$45.00 Smaller blooms of deep *ivory* petals. This is a strong plant that blooms very early. Slightly fragrant.

Buckeye Belle - (Mains, 1956) Herbaceous Hybrid, ALM 2009, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$35.00 Semi-double hybrid with extremely *dark red* guard petals surrounding a mix of narrow deep red petals and gold staminodes. Flowers are on long stems above foliage. Very striking early bloom.

Burma Ruby – (Glasscock, 1951) Herbaceous Hybrid; APS Gold Medal 1985, ALM 2009, **NEW**

\$35.00 Single intense *red* petals surround red stamens edged with gold. Fairly short, slightly fragrant, early blooming plant that deserves the Award of Landscape Merit.

Callie's Memory – (Anderson, 1999) Intersectional, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$130.00 A large *apricot cream* semi-double with a maroon centre. Excellent foliage, slight fragrance and extended bloom with a few side-buds. Blooms midseason.

Carrara – (Bigger, 1952) Lactiflora

\$30.00 Japanese form with *white* petals surrounding a gold centre. Buds open white and stay white. Flowers early midseason.

Charm – (Franklin, 1931) Lactiflora; Award of Landscape Merit 2009, **SOLD OUT**

\$35.00 Very *dark red* Japanese bloom with exceptionally dark red stems in the spring. The guard petals surround red petaloids edged in yellow. Fragrant. A personal favourite. Flowers mid to late season.

Cherry Royal - (Wild & Son, 1967) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$30.00 A very full double lactiflora in a deep *magenta* colour. Flowers midseason.

Chippewa – (Murawska, 1943) Lactiflora

\$40.00 Double. A medium size very *dark red* bloom on dark red stems. A great cut and garden flower. Flowers midseason.

Cincinnati – (Krekler, 1962) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Large, double *deep pink* flowers, with petals tipped with *silver*. Excellent foliage. Flowers late.

- Claire de Lune**- (White, 1954) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW SOLD OUT**
 \$45.00 A stunning *pale yellow* single hybrid that blooms very early. The centre of bright yellow stamens gives a deeper yellow tone to the flower. Petal colour may fade as the flowers mature.
- Claude Barrow Jr.** – (Kelsey, 1939) Lactiflora, **NEW, SOLD OUT**
 \$25.00 A full double *medium pink* bloom that is very fragrant. Flowers early midseason.
- Cora Louise** – (Anderson, 1986) Intersectional, **NEW, SOLD OUT**
 \$130.00 These semi-double flowers are *white with lavender* flares. The slightly fragrant blooms are held upright on strong stems. Blooms midseason.
- Coral Charm**- (Wissing, 1964) Herbaceous Hybrid; APS Gold Medal 1986, **SOLD OUT**
 \$30.00 A semi-double cup shaped *coral peach* flower that is very popular for landscape and cut flowers. The colour fades toward yellow tones but this just enhances its charm. Vigorous and early blooming.
- Coral ‘n Gold** – (Cousins-Klehm, 1981) Herbaceous Hybrid, ALM 2009, **NEW, SOLD OUT**
 \$35.00 One of the *corals* developed by the Canadian breeder, Lyman Cousins. A double row of guard petals contrast with the thick golden stamens. Blooms early midseason.
- Coral Sunset** – (Wissing 1965) Herbaceous Hybrid; APS Gold 2003, ALM 2009 **SOLD OUT**
 \$40.00 A deep *coral* semi-double with ruffled edges. The colour fades to ivory, so both colours may appear together. Fragrant with excellent foliage and strong stems. Blooms early midseason.
- Cytherea** - (Saunders, 1953) Herbaceous Hybrid; APS Gold 1980, ALM 2009, **SOLD OUT**
 \$35.00 Semi-double. Deep *rose pink* large cupped flowers. Strong growing and early blooming.
- Dainty** – (Nicholls, 1941) Lactiflora
 \$35.00 Single, light silvery *pink* large flower formed by two rows of wide petals surrounding yellow stamens. A strong garden plant and show flower. Blooms early.
- Dandy Dan** – (Auten E. Jr., 1946) Herbaceous Hybrid, **SOLD OUT**
 \$30.00 Semi-double dark *claret red* with all its petals the same size. Faint fragrance. Flowers early.
- Diana Parks**- (Bockstoe, 1942) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW, SOLD OUT**
 \$45.00 A fire-engine double *red* with large guard petals surrounding smaller inner petals. Slightly fragrant, early blooming and vigorous.
- Dinner Plate** – (Klehm Carl G., 1968) Lactiflora, **SOLD OUT**
 \$20.00 Double. Hugh *shell-pink* flowers. Strong plant and stems but best with some support. Slight fragrance. Excellent cut flower. Height 34 inches. Flowers midseason.
- Do Tell** – (Auten, 1946) Lactiflora; APS Gold Medal 2004, ALM 2009, **NEW, SOLD OUT**
 \$30.00 A striking Japanese form flower with *soft shell pink* petals complementing a centre of mixed shades of pink. A mid season favourite.
- Dragon’s Nest** - (Auten, 1933) Lactiflora, **NEW**
 \$40.00A *dark red* Japanese form peony with a collar of yellow staminodes. Leaves are pointed, crinkled medium green that display well all season. A few side-buds extend the bloom. Bloom midseason.
- Early Glow** - (Hollingsworth, 1992) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW, SOLD OUT**
 \$30.00 An *ivory* cup-shaped single peony with side buds to prolong the bloom. Red stigmata show well among the yellow stamens. Blooms early.
- Early Scout** – (Auten, 1952) Herbaceous Hybrid
 \$35.00 Very deep *red* flowers with distinctive dissected foliage. Height 21 inches. Ideal for rock gardens or front of border. A favourite. Flowers very early

Edith M. Snook – (Snook, 1931) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Distinctive, double, fragrant rose-shaped *ivory* flower on strong stems. Mid late bloom.

Eldorado - (Auten, 1956) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$40.00 A very *dark red* double that blooms early midseason. A tuft of narrow petals or petaloids often develop in the centre of the stamens.

Ella Christiansen – (Brand, 1925) Lactiflora, **SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 Double. Very large fragrant *medium pink* flowers that hold their colour well. Floriferous with strong stems. Flowers midseason

Ensign Moriarty - (Lins 1945) Lactiflora, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 A very large double *medium dark pink* on strong stems. It has many side-buds for extended bloom and great golden autumn colour. Flowers midseason.

Etched Salmon - (Cousins, 1981) Herbaceous Hybrid; APS Gold 2002, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$50.00 A double *salmon-pink* by the Canadian breeder, Lyman Cousins. Beautiful form and unusual colour make this a very popular peony. Fragrant and blooms midseason.

Fairy Princess - (Glasscock, 1955) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**

\$30.00 A bright true *red* single that contrasts well with the shiny deep green foliage. A dwarf plant of about 20 inches, it makes a great front of the border or rock garden plant. Blooms midseason.

Fairy's Petticoat – (Klehm Carl G., 1970) Lactiflora

\$30.00 Extremely large, *blush-pink* with a golden glow from the centre. As many as three side buds on strong stems. Fragrant. Height 32 inches. Flowers early.

Fancy Nancy – (Auten, 1944) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$30.00 A beautiful soft *cerise-pink* Japanese peony. The centre staminodes are mainly soft cerise pink but also lighter and darker shades. Blooms midseason.

Feather Top – (Wild, 1967) Lactiflora

\$40.00 Very unusual shaped Japanese form, with 6-7 rows of *magenta* petals topped with a ring of yellow tipped staminodes and then topped with rose pink petals. It blooms midseason with good foliage.

Felix Crousse – (Crousse, 1881) Lactiflora; RHS Award of Merit, **SOLD OUT**

\$25.00 Double. A bright *crimson* with enlarged outer petals. Very floriferous, producing clusters of flowers. Flowers mid to late season.

Felix Supreme - (Kriek 1955) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$40.00 A fragrant double *ruby red* with outstanding shiny dark green foliage. Side buds for extra bloom. Blooms midseason.

Festiva Maxima – (Miellez, 1851) Lactiflora, **SOLD OUT**

\$25.00 Double. Very large *white* with crimson flecks on centre petals. This fragrant old variety is a strong grower and continues to be very popular. Flowers early midseason.

Firelight – (Saunders, 1950) Herbaceous Hybrid, **SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 Semi-double. Deep *rose pink* with darker flares and crimson stigmas surrounding a gold centre. A family favourite. Flowers early.

First Arrival- (Anderson, 1986) Intersectional, **NEW**

\$130.00 A quite full semi-double *lavender-pink* flower on a compact dark green plant. The base of the petals is dark lavender. An excellent garden plant with abundant flowers. Blooms midseason.

Florence Nicholls – (Nicholls, 1938) Lactiflora

\$ 25.00 Very large rose-shaped of *blush white* with a deeper tone in centre. Very fragrant and floriferous. Strong stems with many side buds. Medium height. Flowers midseason.

Garden Treasure - (Hollingsworth, 1984) Intersectional, APS Gold Medal1996, ALM2009, **NEW**.

SOLD OUT \$130.00 A truly outstanding semi-double *yellow* peony with soft red flares. It is very floriferous with several side-buds per stem opening sequentially for more than 2 weeks. It is fragrant and has excellent foliage well into the autumn. Blooms midseason.

Gardenia – (Lins, 1949) Lactiflora, **SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 Double *blush white* with a slight fragrance. A truly beautiful flower with a glow of golden stamens and occasionally a streak of pink. Blooms in midseason.

Gay Paree – (Auten, 1933) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Very striking, Japanese type lactiflora with outer guard petals of deep *magenta* and light pink center. Slight fragrance. Flowers midseason.

George W. Peyton – (Nicholls, 1938) Lactiflora

\$20.00 Large *pale buff* with a hint of pink especially toward the centre. Blooms midseason.

Gilbert H. Wild - (Nicholls/Wild, 1957) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$30.00 A stunning double of *medium pink* with slightly lighter pink edges. Golden stamens are present in a circle with pink petals in the centre. Many side-buds and good foliage. Some support would be helpful for best viewing. Bloom midseason.

Going Bananas - (Anderson) Intersectional, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$130.00 A single *yellow* peony with soft red flares. Another strong intersectional. Blooms early midseason.

Golden Wheel – (unknown, China) Lactiflora, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$100.00 This peony has several names but was originally called Huang Jin Lun. It is a double *yellow* with yellow green foliage. Truly unique. Bloom midseason.

Green Lotus – (Klehm, 1995) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$30.00 Most distinct peony with *whitish* petals and petaloids surrounded by light green. Petals are fairly narrow. Blooms midseason.

Grover Cleveland – (Terry, 1904) Lactiflora

\$20.00 Bright crimson *red* double on a medium height plant with excellent foliage. Blooms mid to late.

Hawaii – (Murawska, 1960) Lactiflora, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 A lovely *pink* with a full soft yellow centre. Good presentation and fragrance. Early midseason.

Heavenly Pink- (unknown/Smirnow, 1974) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**, **SOLD OUT**

\$45.00 An extremely large, very double *bright pink* that makes an excellent cut flower. Has won 'Best of Show' for us. Opens slowly because it is so full. Has good foliage but needs support. Early midseason.

Henry Sass - (Sass, 1949) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Pure *white*, fully double and large with strong stems and slight fragrance. Very striking and excellent cut flower. Flowers midseason.

Hillary - (Anderson, 1999) Intersectional; Award of Landscape Merit 2009, **NEW**

\$130.00 A semi-double *red/yellow* blend. It opens pink/red with the outer petals gradually fading to cream. When in full bloom, several different colour tones will be present at the same time. Blooms midseason.

Horizon - (Saunders, 1943) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**

\$30.00 A single *flesh-tone pink* with a touch of magenta surrounding golden stamens. Blooms early season.

Hot Chocolate – (Sass, 1971) Lactiflora, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$40.00 A favourite dark *burgundy red* with the staminodes slightly edged in gold. The blooms are broad shaped Japanese form with the guard petals slightly cupped. Blooms early midseason.

Ilini Belle – (Glasscock, 1941) Herbaceous Hybrid

\$30.00 Semi-double with four or five rows of glossy *ruby-red* petals and yellow stamens. Slight fragrance. Flowers early.

Ilini Warrior – (Glasscock, 1955) Herbaceous Hybrid

\$30.00 Semi-double. Beautiful *cardinal red* petals surround yellow anthers. Vigorous. Flowers early.

Isani Gidui – (Japanese, pre-1928) **SOLD OUT**

\$30.00 Japanese form with 2 rows of large, pure *white* petals surrounding a centre of yellow staminodes. This plant of medium height is vigorous and floriferous with slightly crinkled foliage. Blooms late.

Joanna Marlene – (Anderson, 1999) Intersectional, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$130.00 A semi-double with *pinkish lavender* guard petals. The centre fades from pink to yellow tones. Another great intersectional for garden display and cut flower. Blooms midseason.

Julia Rose – (Anderson) Intersectional, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$130.00 A semi-double with interesting fade patterns like Hillary. It starts out cherry *red/pink* and fades to orange and then to yellow tones. A lovely display of several colours when the plant is covered with blooms. Blooms midseason.

June Rose – (Jones, 1938) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Large rose-shaped *cerise pink* bloom that holds its colour well. Dark green foliage. Striking and slightly fragrant. Height 31 inches. Flowers midseason.

Kansas – (Bigger, 1940) Lactiflora; APS Gold Medal, 1957

\$25.00 Popular, deep *fuchsia-purple* (considered red) which does not fade. Vigorous with strong stems. Height 36 inches. Flowers midseason.

Karl Rosenfield – (Rosenfield, 1908) Lactiflora

\$20.00 Large, globe-shaped bright *crimson* (considered red). Free-flowering with strong stems. Good garden and cut-flower variety. Height 31 inches. Flowers mid to late season.

Kaw Valley – (Bigger, 1944) Lactiflora, **SOLD OUT**

\$35.00 Double. Enormous *deep pink* with good foliage and strong stems. Excellent cut flower. Blooms early to midseason.

\$40.00 A single *soft pink* with gold anthers and red filaments for a pleasing contrast. Blooms very early.

Show Girl - (Hollingsworth, 1984) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$30.00 A Japanese form of warm *medium pink* guard petals surrounding a large centre of creamy-yellow petalodes. Some pink petals may form a tuft in the centre on mature plants. An excellent landscape plant and successful exhibition flower. Bloom midseason.

Skylark – (Saunders, 1942) Herbaceous Hybrid, **NEW**

\$35.00 Single *bright rose pink* flower with loose yellow stamens. Very attractive. Blooms early midseason.

Souvenir de Louis Bigot – (Dessert, 1913) Lactiflora

\$20.00 Large blooms of vivid *rose pink* with slightly lighter edges. An older cut flower variety that is still very popular. Bloom midseason.

Sprite – (Saunders, 1950) Herbaceous Hybrid, **SOLD OUT**

\$40.00 Single, *ivory white* apple blossom flowers with pink edges. Delightful. Flowers early.

Sunshine Sensation – (Anderson) Intersectional, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

Walter Faxon – (Richardson, 1904) Lactiflora, **NEW**

\$30.00 A lovely true *shell pink* that may fade to soft pink in hot sun. A full double which makes an excellent cut flower. One of the most popular for bridal bouquets. Good foliage. Blooms midseason.

Walter Mains – (Mains, 1957) Herbaceous Hybrid; APS Gold Medal 1974, **SOLD OUT**

\$45.00 Japanese form on a tidy plant about 24 in. Large, *dark red* guard petals surrounding staminodes of the same colour edged in bright yellow. Blooms midseason.

Watermelon Wine – (Anderson, 1999) Intersectional, **NEW, SOLD OUT**

\$130.00 *Red pink* single with dark raspberry red flares at the base of each petal. A strong grower with excellent dark green foliage. Fragrant. Blooms early midseason.

Westerner – (Bigger, 1942) Lactiflora; APS Gold Medal 1982

\$ 25.00 A Japanese shape, medium *pink* flower filled with bright yellow staminodes. Vigorous with sturdy stems and many side buds. Height 36 inches. A visitor favourite. Flowers late season.

White Water – (Kelsey, 1942) Lactiflora

\$25.00 Large, *white* beautiful bloom with strong stems. Blooms mid to late season with side buds for extended bloom. Very fragrant and excellent green foliage well into autumn.

Peony Growing Tips

Peonies are long-lived perennials, so it is worth the effort to prepare the site well and purchase quality plants. Peonies are one of the least demanding perennials giving outstanding bloom and all season foliage on disease and pest resistant plants.

Soil: Peonies prefer a sunny well drained site. Dig a hole larger than the root and amend the soil with compost or bonemeal. Very well aged manure may be used in moderation. Peonies will not survive in waterlogged soil.

Planting: Place the peony root in the prepared hole and backfill. The crown buds should be no more than 2 inches below the soil surface. If planted too deep, they may not flower for several years. Plant potted peonies at the same depth as they are in the pots.

Watering: Peonies are drought tolerant but would benefit from watering if the weather is dry during the first season. If you mulch your garden, do not put mulch over the crown.

After Flowering: When the peonies have finished flowering, cut off the spent blooms but leave as much foliage as possible to promote strong roots.

Winter Care: In September, cut foliage off and remove it from the garden to help prevent spread of any possible disease or fungus.
